NEW SUNSPOT: New sunspot 1130 is rapidly developing near the center of the sun's disk and "it is crackling with activity," reports Michael Borman of Evansville, Indiana. Using a backyard solar telescope, he took <u>this picture</u> of a B -class explosion from the active region on Nov. 28th. So far, the flares have been relatively minor, but if the sunspot's growth continues apace, geo-effective blasts could be in the offing.

WEEKEND AURORAS: A gust of solar wind hit Earth's magnetic field on Saturday, Nov. 27th, sparking a brief but intense geomagnetic storm around the Arctic Circle. Onlookers described "an explosion of Northern Lights" and a "huge outburst of auroras" that turned the heavens vivid green. One day later, the sky was still glowing, as shown in this Sunday night snapshot from Kvaløya, an island near Tromsø, Norway:



"We had some clouds," says photographer Frank Olsen, "but I could still see some nice auroras. It was another wonderful night in northern Norway." The solar wind is subsiding now, and the auroras are fading. NOAA forecasters estimate only a 10% chance of geomagnetic activity during the next 24 hours.

Phil writes: "The antennas on the tower from top to bottom are a Diamond tri-band vertical for 2, 6, and 440, under that is an 11 element Cushcraft for 2 meters, under that is another Cushcraft 11 element beam for 220 Mhz. Then the 3 element Mosley for 10, 15 and 20 meters. Off the side is my Windom for 6 through 160.Off the opposite is a dipole for my scanner."






The race car is '47 Chevy Coup. Both front and back fenders are fiberglass. The rest of the body is steel. The engine is a 383 stroker 350 V8 block bored 30 over with a 400 cubic inch steel crank. The heads are Brodex aluminum race heads. The Cam is a high lift Comp Cam. The pistons are Wesco race pistons. The intake is a Weiand aluminum with a 750 Holley double pumper. The transmission is a Coen Race Glide with a 8" high stall converter. The rear end is a 9" Ford, 456 gears and a spool to lock axles together. The car's best 1/4 mile E.T. was 10.9 seconds at 123 miles per hour. The top right picture was taken in 1999 at Norwalk OH. at the bracket finals when I was racing on the Muncie Dragway team in the Pro class.
